By the way Ptolemy Baddock is our new prefect, in case Percy didn't tell you. He's really shaken up by everything.

So I spent a lot of the afternoon reading. I kept getting sidetracked by interesting things, like did you know that all THREE of the cardinal curses were invented by a Ravenclaw? Like Lovegood said, not exactly her house's finest hour. The wizard who invented Avada Kedavra was killed when someone else cast it on him, and the person who cast it on him was taking revenge because his son had been killed with it and he went mad with grief. The witch who invented cruciatus was doing research into the different areas of the brain and in the notes she left when she died she said that she had been thinking that if we understood more about the body's ability to feel pain she thought it would be useful to healers. And according to Lovegood the cruciatus curse is used at St Mungo's in certain cases BUT you know it's mostly used for other things. (The interesting thing is that in order to cast cruciatus you really need to WANT to cause someone unbearable pain. If what you WANT is to cure someone's paralysis it won't work! Apparently it feels really good to have Imperius cast on you, in sort of the way it feels really good to lie under a tree on a sunny day during your holiday. You don't worry about anything or care about anything.

It didn't work at ALL for teaching people anything but it works very well to make them obey. Until it wears off and then if they remember what you did, they might come kill you.

It MIGHT be possible to cast it on someone who isn't right there and it's DEFINITELY possible to keep it on someone while you can't see them, although it's hard. And you CAN use a person under imperius to cast spells that you know how to do and they don't, though results can be unpredictable. So someone could cast it on someone and make them cast the killing curse, is what I'm saying. And you can pair it with other things so they don't really remember what happened, although this is super advanced magic but if we're talking about Carrow...

And just so you know, the book said the killing curse is painless, they know because there are some people who were hit with it who came back as ghosts. The killing curse rips your soul from your body, is how it works, and it was developed by someone who was trying to understand what the soul actually is.

Anyway. Ron. And Fred and George. Your sister acted really strange and while it doesn't sound EXACTLY like what would happen if she were under the Imperius curse I think you lot (meaning you Gryffindors) need to watch her really closely. Order Only: The Ministry and Owls, plus Rookwood

Two things: first I want to report that the Minister of Magic is being flooded with owls from parents <u>Aalt bill</u> demanding that the MLE take over the investigation of the latest incident at Hogwarts. Apparently, Fudge is not particularly appreciating the complaints. The order came down from Senior Undersecretary Umbridge that any owl used to deliver one of these complaints should be promptly confiscated from its owner by the Ministry, with the excuse that the Ministry needs the owl's services 'for the duration of the crisis.' Dolores Umbridge failed to consider, however, that her title does not impress most owls. They'll only work for someone other than their owners if the owners expressly gives permission for them to be lent out to somebody else. The Ministry owl handlers suffered some bad pecking and talon scratch attacks while the owls made this clear to them.

Secondly, and this is <u>big</u>. As you may know, I generally keep up an energetic correspondence with my family by owl, but that's stopped since Mum's donated the family owls to Ministry use. But in the last one she sent, she asked a question I've been thinking about ever since, and thought might be of interest to others.

As you may know, my last year at Hogwarts was the year our Lord Protector came to power - and it was a time of great uncertainty in many ways. Mum asked how I felt about being here now, compared to being here then.

Back then, it was - well, scary. You'd hear scraps of news, or see someone being pulled out of class by a teacher, reappearing hours later pale and teary. There were rumours of all kinds about who was doing what, and who was helping which side. There was great tension not only between the four houses, but between members of many of them. All of us - purebloods included - worried about what might be coming for us and how that would affect not only us, but our friends. Not that different from now, though the reasons for nervousness are different.

Like now, we felt quite isolated. News was filtered before it reached us, to avoid panic in the school. Trips outside Hogwarts were rare in those last few years. And yet, the world inside Hogwarts was painfully limited, for everywhere you went, there was a possibility of an argument, or a messy conversation, or news you just didn't want to hear. No matter how big the castle, you find other people eventually.

Two things were especially hard. One was the news of people you'd thought you knew, doing things that didn't seem possible Any number of deaths, especially for those recently out of Hogwarts, who were still remembered by their housemates and siblings and cousins and extended families: people we remembered vividly and clearly as

laughing and joking and living. Most shocking, I think, were the Head Boys, Head Girls, and prefects who came to bad ends. How confusing to have looked up to someone for years, and then find out, all in a rush, that they were dead or disgraced, often for something no one would discuss in detail.

The other hard thing was that we had very little guidance. Now that I'm in a teacher's shoes, I understand the difficulty. All rumour to the contrary, I did not get presented with some magical device to help me guide students wisely through complex decisions when I returned as a teacher.

But I do wish there'd been something. Of course, I asked my parents, my aunts and uncles and older cousins for advice. But those people - as loving as they are - also remembered me as a tot, and as a silly tenyear-old, and all sorts of other things that shape memory.

As I look back, I wish more and more for guidance from other adults in the community as we left school and cast about in those first few years about how to make our way in our new lives. We went from the protection of Hogwarts to the deep waters of a strange new world, and had nothing to help us keep our balance. And again, some of us succeeded more than others, and all of us remember those of promise who fell along the way. And yet, without knowing why those others fell, all of us feared doing the same, for some reason we didn't know to avoid.

As a teacher, I have no wish to stick my nose into a student's personal affairs, unless those affairs directly affect their learning or other students. And, like all the staff here, I certainly have enough other things on my mind that I'm scarcely looking for more things to fill my day. And yet, I keep wondering what might be different if we did make more time for these things.

But I am glad, these days, to see that more staff here make some attempt to reach out. Poppy has made it easier and easier for students to seek her out. While Professor Slughorn's gatherings are legendary, I'm delighted to see more staff opening their doors for similar gatherings or sponsoring clubs of interest.

To that end: students who are interested in general conversation, I am glad to open my office to you on Tuesday, Thursday, and Sunday nights, after dinner until eight. No particular agenda, and no butting into your decisions, but a chance to have conversations somewhere about topics other than school

I would also - for any students who read this far - encourage you to take time to find things that engage you in multiple ways. Find time to be quietly alone and think. Find time to spend with friends. Spend time on both your studies and your hobbies. Be gentle with each other - you may not know the pressures someone else or their family is under right now. Get to know others - the people you meet now will continue to intersect your lives for decades to come. I'm excited about steps students have already taken - the new proposed clubs and organisations for example - and I hope to see still more in future.

We started out talking about the night sky, of course. As all of you who've been doing obervations know, Venus is about to reach a point of exceptional brilliancy, to the point that (as the moon wanes) Venus can almost cast a shadow by itself. Greetings, British Wizarding World!

Last weekend in America, they celebrated the birth of one of their former presidents. He was a man named Abraham Lincoln, and he was perhaps most famous of their political leaders because he led the country during its Civil War. That war was fought

over a difference in philosophy astonishingly similar to the one in which we find ourselves. When half his nation chose to defend the practice of racial slavery, he freed them by presidential edict. Lincoln followed in the footsteps of great British men like William Wilberforce, who successfully outlawed slave trading in Great Britain more than fifty years before Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation.

While Wilberforce died peaceably just three days after learning Britain would abolish slavery, Lincoln was assassinated because he made a decision that was progressive and just.

Obviously, I'm over-simplifying the situation. Other historians can offer a lot more detail, most of it more accurate than I can provide. Books and examinations of his life – and death – fill entire shelves in libraries and bookstores, not just in America, but all over the world.

In the case of British wizardom, your leaders have borrowed opinions and positions from, among other things, slave-owners of the 18th and 19th centuries, undoing all the good Wilberforce achieved on the topic two hundred years ago. They cling to the fiction that purity of blood is a shield to all sorts of hardship – especially illness. I've read posts swearing that 'Muggle paralysis' (also known as the Herfordshire Scourge) has no effect on purebloods, that halfbloods who contract it are somehow weaker for their susceptibility to the disease. I have even seen purebloods claiming that those who have died due to the Scourge somehow deserved their fate. As if anyone who falls prey to a germ *deserves* to sicken and fail!

But there are those who have suspected for a while that this disease had a more sinister beginning. They theorised that the Ministry may have been trying to kill off the Muggle population, despite the fact that without them, as we've seen, your society would quickly collapse. Well, they're partially right. The motive wasn't genocide, but in some ways, much more insidious and repulsive. I recently came into

possession of evidence that the source of the epidemic gripping the country was none other than an experiment begun in the camps by the Department of Mysteries itself.

'Project Panacea,' so dubbed by its Ministry overseers, began as a trial in selected internment camps in the spring and summer of last year. The premise was to introduce a potion into the drinking water, which would ensure the cooperation and willing subjugation of all its drinkers. I gather it was conceived as a potable version of the Imperius Curse. Unspeakable Augustus Rookwood conducted a few controlled experiments, first on animals in the DoM, then on human subjects in Epping Forest and elsewhere. The effort was expanded to all camps in the early autumn. The effects, as we have seen, were dramatic. By mid-October, there were cases spreading throughout the Muggleborn and Muggle communities.

I don't believe it took long for the Ministry to realise the camp populations were under attack, but I do think it took some time for them to connect the DoM's involvement to their predicament. Tracing the threads, it looks like what turned the tide was an incident in early November, when the Ministry attempted to meet the labour shortage by awakening some of the Muggles you refer to as 'Sleepers.' The Ministry and the camp administrators must have known that the Sleepers would be disorientated and less docile when they were revived, so they contrived to provide a high-dose regimen of Rookwood's 'panacea' potion in an attempt to make them pliable. You may recall that in mid-November the epidemic suddenly took a dramatic turn for the worse? That was the moment that these poor souls were unwittingly infected with enough of Rookwood's panacea poison to send them into paralysis.

Unfortunately, by that time, it seems the disease had taken its own turn for the worse. It adapted somehow, mutated to find new hosts, and the first halfblood cases were already showing up. If it can mutate once, it is only a matter of time before a pureblood falls.

In all fairness to the Ministry, I suppose it should be acknowledged that the goal was not to kill any of the subjects. The fact that the contagion was introduced in the water explains why the camp personnel were never infected; I can't imagine many workers would deign to drink the same water as their charges. But the fact remains that the Ministry covered up its secret agenda. Had anyone shared the Department of Mysteries dossier with St Mungo's, the Healers might have been able to understand and control the spread of this ailment much sooner. The lives that could have been saved, the

suffering that could have been avoided, had they owned up to the Grim Truth, may never be quantified.

But they must be held accountable. The Ministry are responsible for this plague. Even had not a single life been lost, they are responsible for the wholesale oppression of innocent people and they are culpable in the attempt to rob those workers of their free will. Augustus Rookwood and his colleagues directly brought about a public health crisis and compounded it through their attempts to obfuscate their involvement in that same crisis.

I don't pretend that the Ministry will seek justice on behalf of the thousands who have died or become paralysed, even those who have suffered milder cases of Panacea poisoning. Nonetheless, I could not in conscience withhold this information from you, especially when forcing it into the light might also compel the Ministry to work with St Mungo's on a credible cure.

I pray they put reason above self-interest, for all your sakes.

We're getting into the lean time of year, too soon for spring crops, but people's larders have more and more empty shelves. I've had many occasions to bless our well-developed barter network in previous years. There are about thirty-five families

in the network Arthur and I use. Usually everyone can find something to sell or trade, which helps us all get through until the gardens start producing again.

The quarantine is complicating things this year, of course. As one of the network organisers, I made the rounds yesterday of about a third of the families in the network--not going into people's houses, you understand of course, just in case, but simply popping into people's yards and checking that everyone is healthy and well. And everyone is, thank goodness. We've organised a system of drop boxes on people's back steps. If you have something to barter, you leave a message in your journal for the recipient and leave whatever-it-is in the box, under antiseptic protective charms. There are several of us who have taken the job of ferrying goods between drop boxes (to assist those who are stuck in their houses under the travel restrictions). We'll drop the package in the drop box at the house of the recipient, and then that person will scourgify the item again, and take it in.

So I had a number of pleasant visits vesterday, held under awkward conditions, with me standing there in my boots ankle-deep in the snow, conversing with somebody through the glass of their kitchen window (using amplification charms, mind you--I'm sure we frightened away a lot of birds). A few people haven't seen anyone else since the travel restrictions were put into place, and seemed just starved for company. It was past dark before I said good night to the last and made it home. But everyone, as I said, was quite well, and they were all happy to see me, as well as the packages I delivered. It was rather pleasant to play delivery owl for a day.







Colin will have a tree for Dennis, and Felicia will have one for her mum and little sister, and a tree for Matthew Fawcett's mum, and Judith and Freddy for Freddy's father, and Victor for his wife (not Arabella, of course, but the woman he was married to before), and Danny for his parents, and Alec and John for their parents, and Frank and I will plant a tree for all our close friends and family we lost during the war.

And it's not just for Moddey Dhoo, it's for all of us, so if there's anyone that you want to plant a tree for, we will. We've all of us suffered many losses over the years. Too many, really. And it's a bitter potion to swallow each and every time. But I'm hoping that a peaceful green place where we can remember happier times might help. It certainly can't hurt.

Here it is: if Bill were truly innocent, he'd have been caught utterly by surprise yesterday to learn that a trusted member of his department may well have been some sort of traitor. If Bill were truly loyal to the Protectorate, then the first thing he'd be expected to apply his formidable skills to solving is the question of whether anything in Archer's work will yield any clues upon a close reinspection. So I'd think Bill ought to be making a deliberate show not only of co-operating with the investigation, but also of reexamining anything in his files on which Archer had a role.




