Did you arrange the flowers per my request? Jonquils, orchids and roses, as instructed.


Do recall it is the first of the month and accounts must be settled.







The Draught

In my promise to my readers, I submitted that I shall not allow any false instructions to stand. It is in that spirit that I inform you: arsenic exposure, either by skin or ingestion, is highly toxic.

Nitroglycerin must be made in an ice bath to prevent violent explosions in the course of its creation. Caustic soda mixed with water will rapidly dissolve anything it comes into contact with, including



dissolve anything it comes into contact with, including bladders and human skin. The application of arsenic soap will do nothing to prevent this effect.

Any such chemical experiments suggested by writers MUST be practised first on an extremely small scale. Thus, if the reaction is harmful and the chemistry incorrect, the damage will be to your equipment and not to yourself.

I am, to my irritation, seeing a preponderance of journal entries which call upon their readers to seek ingredients not found in nature nor in their immediate environs. Any ingredients which you must rely upon others to provide are to be suspect. Any ingredients which must be purchased without reasonable pretense, such as a quantity of bladders, quicksilver, gunpowder, dynamite, or arsenic soap, are to be suspect. I had, at first, dismissed such writers merely as stunningly poor chemists whose incompetence was rivaled only by their recklessness. However, given the demands for ingredients that can easily be tracked at the point of purchase, I must conclude that those who ask such things have neither the safety nor the liberty of their readers at heart.

On The Practice of Occlumency - Part II

In the previous instalment of this series on Occlumency, the most basic method of resisting an intruder - wiping the mind clean of thought - was outlined. While an effective preventative, it likewise is the surest sign to those attempting to glean information that resistance techniques are being used. Thus, utilising the blank template which study will achieve, we shall learn to paint an environment which mimics the normal workings of the mind.

A practitioner of Legilimency will encounter three things as they enter a mind: emotions, memories, and impressions. Emotions are the mind's response to a given situation, memories are associations conjured by current happenings, and impressions are the feedback which the eyes give directly to the mind - in other words, that which is happening in the present moment. If any one of the three are missing, the illusion of viewing a normal mind is shattered. We shall begin with the simplest of the three. It is essential to continue the practice, established in Part I, of using the word 'Legilimens' as a trigger to induce the illusion. Speak this word aloud, or have a trusted associate speak it for you, before commencing these exercises.

A memory, to an intruder, will appear as a series of moving images similar to a film or moving photograph. In order to prevent oneself thinking of those memories which will best serve the purposes of an interrogator, one must practise thinking of a memory which is unrelated to the pertinent information, yet appropriate to the situation at hand. As it is yet quite difficult for those few who practice Legilimency to do so without the knowledge of their victim, said situation is likely to inspire fear and uncertainty. Choose one memory which is associated with these feelings, and practise bringing it and only it to the surface after blankness has been achieved. Once other memories intrude, cease and rest before trying again.

Once this memory can be called upon at will and sustained for minutes at a time, it is time to practise the addition of emotions. The emotions of a victim will be briefly experienced by an intruder, and have no visual component. Again, fear is the most potent and most natural of the emotions which will be experienced in an interrogation. Confusion, too, is a common emotion of the innocent under inquiry. Nearly every person has been wrongly accused of some act, either minor or major in severity, at some point in life. This emotion is the one which must join fear to create the illusion of blamelessness. Practise also calling forth anger, disgust, and indignation. When other feelings begin to occur besides those which have been chosen, or the chosen memory becomes vague, cease and rest.

Impressions call upon one to open one's mind to the happenings about them, which is difficult to maintain whilst creating a mental fallacy. Meditation and concentration will shut out some if not all of the sights and sounds of one's environs in favour of the considerable mental task at hand. A lack of impressions will betray the efforts of one attempting to screen themselves. In order to introduce impressions of the immediate surroundings, allow that sensory input to wash over the mind while at the same time maintaining the fearful memory and the emotions of alarm and confusion. Think of impressions as rainwater on a glass pane, and do not allow them to disturb or alter your

illusion.

This final step will take the most time to establish, but it is essential in this practice to take heart in incremental measures of success. The cost is effort, and the reward is security.

The Treatment of Minor Burns: Poultice of Burdock Leaves

In the case of first and second degree burns, a poultice of burdock leaves is effective in healing the wound. Burdock is a biennial member of the thistle family, and is to be found on English roadsides and countrysides following its introduction in the early 19th century. It is distinguished by its broad, flat leaves, which are reminiscent of those of the rhubarb plant. Be careful to distinguish between the two, and study the illustration below before harvesting. This harvesting is done in the summer months, and only leaves which are palm-sized or larger should be gathered. While it is best to have a supply of dried leaves available for the purposes of first aid, freshly harvested leaves - washed thoroughly - will serve in cases of urgent need.



First, test an area of uninjured skin for adverse reactions by applying a fresh or dampened burdock leaf to the area. If there is no irritation or swelling after five minutes, proceed with the treatment. Clean the wound completely. Assuming a supply of dried burdock leaves, rehydrate them by soaking them for five minutes in warm water before applying them to the wound. Immediately cover the leaves with a dry, clean cloth, and secure it firmly. In the event that only fresh washed burdock leaves are available, inspect them minutely for insects and impurities before use and reject those which are anything less than clean. Reapply this same poultice twice each day lest the

leaves stick to the healing skin. Wash the affected area between applications.

As always, use this information wisely.

Well, the answer is both yes and no, Arthur.

You'll see that his essay has occasioned conversation

amongst Healers. I offered to take up the pen to make a statement of our concerns because I believe that the young people here ought to have some warning not to mistake the usefulness of what he recommends.

As he indicates, a poultice of burdock or an application of burdock leaf to minor to moderate burns would offer some relief during recovery from the injury. And burdock has antiseptic properties (its seeds more than its leaves), which is why it is frequently incorporated by Healers in their wound poultices and burn pastes.

But taken as instructions for what to do in the aftermath of a severe burn of the sort caused by any of the calamities he mentions at the opening of his essay (burns from an explosion or from contact with lye), his procedures would not only waste time but also distract from the most essential immediate action demanded, to wit: in the case of deep traumatic or caustic burns, one must first quickly remove any burned or contaminated clothing from the site and then immediately flush the burn with copious amounts of tepid water.

In all burns, but especially those caused by contact with a caustic material or liquid, it is essential that the wound be not merely 'cleaned' (and, goodness, one hopes that common sense dictates it ought not be scrubbed!) but thoroughly flushed for at least 20-30 minutes as the caustic substance will not easily rinse away and will, so long as it is present, continue to consume not merely the skin but the flesh beneath if it is not entirely washed away.

It's troubling that he's not more clear. He opens by specifying that he has in mind the treatment of first- and second-order burns. (But does the average person have any idea which those are or how many orders of burning there might be?) And then he mentions 'cases of urgent need', a phrase which can be expected to raise hope that his procedures might help in dire situations involving quite severe burns.

That's not only untrue, but following his steps would do harm to the sufferer.

You see, under the guise of good sense and expert instruction, he'd have a would-be caregiver dither about, dampening dried burdock or finding fresh, then testing it in uninjured areas, and waiting precious minutes for any sign of irritation. And only then does he mention cleaning the wound? By that point a caustic burn would have eaten its way deep into the flesh and the injured unfortunate

would need far more aid than burdock can offer.

His marks for accuracy are middling at best, Arthur: in his great care to communicate how one ought to prepare the burdock, he entirely muddles the order and necessary procedures for treating the sufferer.

My colleagues at St Mungo's and I feel it is incumbent upon us as Healers to issue a warning to readers of this missive that the suggestions offered herein about the usefulness of BURDOCK are insufficiently clear and

might lead would-be caregivers to do harm rather than the good they intend.

First. There is no instance in which burdock is urgently needed. Burns of great severity--particularly those caused by contact with caustic substances (caustic soda or lye, for instance) or traumatic burns (for instance, those caused by explosions)--do not require the urgent application of burdock. Burdock does not reverse burn damage or halt the burning of caustic contaminants. It is not interventionary Healing magic.

In all cases, the first step in treating burns is to flush or wash the wounded area. Do NOT scrub the damaged flesh. Simply wash it with cool water for a sustained period of time to bring down the temperature of the skin, to flush away any contaminates, and most particularly to wash away any substances that may be causing the burn.

To be clear, then: in cases of severe burns, especially those caused by contact with caustic substances, the first step is to PROMPTLY remove any clothing or material or residue near the burn AND wash the

burned area for **20-30 minutes**. This is essential in cases of caustic burns because caustic substances are often quite difficult to rinse away, and they will, so long as they are present (even in tiny or dilute amounts) continue to consume not merely the skin but the flesh and even the bones beneath.

So what is the use of burdock? As this writer says, as a home remedy in cases of minor or moderate burns like those caused by the sun or a spill of hot water or a small splash of candle wax, burdock leaf (applied to a well-washed wound) may provide some relief for the residual pain, some quickening of recovery, and a degree of protection against infection.



brush from one of the house-elves and started working. But I'm not getting it done tonight and my fingers are getting cramped from holding the little brush so I'm going to write about Dark Arts instead.

So.

The three cardinal curses used to be called 'unforgiveables' because you'd go to Azkaban if you did them on a human, but be careful because it's generally only blood-traitors who say 'unforgiveables' these days. I think Mr and Mrs Weasley are careful not to call them that but they never say Cardinal Curses either, they say, 'the spells that used to be called the Unforgiveable Curses.'

Anyway, each one is strongly associated with a particular emotion. Cruciatus is concentrated hatred. Imperius is contempt. And the killing curse is anger. In some ways that makes it the easiest to cast, because a lot of people never feel enough hatred to cast cruciatus or the arrogance you need for Imperius but everyone (almost everyone) gets angry sometimes. If you've ever gotten angry enough that you've wanted someone dead, you've been angry enough to cast the killing curse.

In Dark Arts class there's quite a lot of talk about 'mindset' and 'controlling your emotions' and what this means, more or less, is that it's actually quite easy to cast a Dark spell (though not necessarily one of the Cardinal Curses because they are so powerful) if you're furiously angry. What makes it really difficult is if you're casting a curse on someone you don't really care about one way or the other. The trick in that case is to summon up the emotion and direct it. When I took my final exam I pretended I was casting the killing curse on Professor Carrow and it worked quite well except that I had my eyes closed so I missed. And, that's the only real defense against the killing curse: dodging.

There are quite a few spells that can be used to kill someone, after all,

from the entrails-expelling curse to wingardium leviosa (you hover someone high enough and drop them, they'll die). What makes AK special is that you can't defend against it, at least not magically -- 'protego' won't do you any good.

The way the spell works is to rip the victim's soul loose from his or her body. And that brings up the real problem -- well, risk, anyway.

This, they don't talk about much in Dark Arts class but after that conversation with Neville last year I was curious so I looked for information about whether the spells change you, and if so, how.

Killing another person does something to your soul. And, it doesn't seem to me that it ought to matter that much whether you use AK or a knife but it does, because your soul and your magic are related in some ways that are difficult to explain (I assume, anyway, because no one really explains them) and when you cast avada kedavra since it rips out the other person's soul it sort of injures your soul in a way that's harder to heal. None of the books explained it very clearly. There was one book that seemed to have a whole section on it that had been sliced out -- and that was in the library, where Madame Pince usually keeps a close eye on things!

It's quite a bit safer to use it on animals, like my father did, because animal souls aren't quite like ours. Also, it takes a lot less power. It's actually a very humane way to kill animals because it's so quick and painless but after studying it I understand better why Mrs Weasley thinks it's better to use an axe.

Anyway, here's how you cast it.

First, you need to feel intense anger, hate, or fear. (Anger is the primary and hate and fear are the secondaries -- that's how she put it in class -- with a whole long list of tertiaries that includes resentment and humiliation and oddly enough romantic love, don't ask me to explain that as it made no sense to me).

Second, you need conviction. Like Goyle (ha) put it in his essay about wandless magic. If you have reservations, the spell will not work. (The mindset stuff also included all sorts of talk about putting aside reservations. Actually she had us do some of the same exercises that Goyle talked about for stopping someone from reading your mind, except in this case the thing you're not trying to think about are your doubts and your sense of whether it's WRONG to go around killing people.)

(Do you see why I say it's a lot easier to do Dark spells if you're casting them on someone you really hate and want to see dead?)

Third, you need to speak aloud. There are all sorts of arguments about whether it is THEORETICALLY possible to cast the killing curse silently (because maybe it's been done and the victims are all dead so NO ONE KNOWS) but the fact is it's an incredibly powerful spell and those are extra hard to cast silently. If a beginner, you also maximize your chance of success by casting it while standing, and by shouting the words at the top of your lungs.

For the actual spell, take a fighting stance, one foot ahead of the other, your weight balanced. The wand movement is to thrust your wand toward the sky on the first word, and sweep it down to point it at the person you're casting it on, on the second. As you sweep the wand down, you shift your weight toward your front foot by bending your knee, as if you were hurling the spell toward them like a bludger. (If you're seated, you can lean forward. This part is not absolutely required, it merely increases your chances of success.) If it works, you will see a green flash envelop your victim and they will fall over dead. Protego will not help them but they can dodge (if they know it's coming).

It leaves no trace and in fact one of the problems historically is that it makes it hard to know that a murder has happened. (This is part of why they made it such a huge crime to even TRY to cast it.)

It is the easiest of the Cardinal Curses to cast in a lot of ways it's the least risky, because you don't have to maintain it.

Oh, and. I should mention that many people our age can't cast it, not to kill a human, anyway. OWL year, that's when most people have enough magical power to seriously try. Some people have their full power earlier. It's hard to know. Most of the hard spells are also complicated and AK isn't, so if you DO have your full power and conditions are right you could use it to kill somebody even if you can't cast a corporeal Patronus Charm, say, because that's just hard to cast. If that makes sense. Anyway, it would be risky to cast but if you have nothing to lose, the more intense your emotion is the stronger the spell will be anyway. So if you're actually in fear of your life, it might work even if it wouldn't otherwise.

It's not the same. They do damage the caster, each in its own way, but they're different.

With Cruciatus, partly it's what you know about yourself, after. Some people can't cast it at all. If you haven't really thought it through and you're pointing your wand at someone you really hate, you can cast it but you can't sustain it. Actually that's what happened with Sandoval, and me, that time in Carrow's office. When I started screaming it startled her so much she almost dropped her wand. Carrow took the mickey over that and so she tried it again and this time she kept it going for ages, or at least it seemed like ages.

And cruciatus is utterly unbearable pain, it's absolutely the worst pain you can imagine. It's not even describable. And usually people scream when you're doing it, you can't possibly pretend to yourself that it's not happening. They scream, they go stiff and rigid like somehow they're trying to get away, if they can get any words out they usually beg for mercy. And as soon as you feel doubt, or pity, or any of that, you're not going to be able to keep it going. Which means that to really be any good at casting the spell you have to LIKE seeing people in pain. Or at least that person.

So if you ever cast it and you succeed, that's what you know about yourself: that you are that sort of person. Who can torture another person in cold blood. Who keeps doing it even when they're not a threat to you. Who likes seeing them in pain.

Sometimes it's just a discovery. But sometimes it's like what I've said about lies, and how people make themselves believe what they say because they don't want to think of themselves as a liar. If they'd never cast cruciatus, they wouldn't have been that sort of person, but that day, they decided that was the sort of person they wanted to be, and they made themselves into it because they wanted the power, or they wanted people to be afraid of them, or they were Head Boy and they didn't want people to think they were a ponce who balked at casting a little spell like cruciatus when you had the permission to do it and everything. And after that, they ARE that sort of person.

And once you are, to STOP being that sort of person you have to be willing to admit that you did something utterly awful.

I confess I don't know whether there are ways to train the mind to be able to fight it once it's cast, but if Kingsley and Frank don't know, then I'd say not. I'd guess it would have been central to Auror training if such a thing were possible. I know your texts gave considerable space to discussing ways of improving one's ability to resist (but not to escape) Imperius. These spells are not unforgivable for no reason. Cruciatus, especially.

If I were there, I could give her something afterwards, but you are all quite right that there is not a thing I know that can help her face the trial unless it were something that would make her lose consciousness pre-emptively and enter a stasis state.

Not that he'd be fooled. He'd know immediately she'd been tampered with and not by another child. And all he'd need do is bide his time and deal with her when she awoke. And in the interval, multiply his plans and will to punish her.

What pray tell did Severus Snape suggest to you? Draught of Living Death? Poison she could hide in her mouth and swallow to end her life if she deemed him likely to read her thoughts?

Casting or dosing with one of the Confunding magics could have a paradoxical effect, heightening rather than lessening both her mental vulnerability and her experience of sensation.

To be honest, I think you ought to use your Portkey, Miss Granger. I cannot counsel you to undergo this 'punishment' because, as all have said, your Unbreakable Vow to us puts your life at risk. We have done you a terrible disservice, putting you in this position.

Honestly, whatever he said about a delayed or prolonged pain potion can only help her in the aftermath. The pain of Cruciatus is not physical. Not originating in the bones or muscles or organs, though it feels acutely to afflict all of them at once.

The Cruciatus curse affects the mind. And cannot be dulled or escaped.

I've said to Miss Granger on her entry that if we were there, we might find a way to put her in a stasis state and make him think her incapable of suffering that way, but only for the time that would last. And yet, the more I think of it, the more I realise that's a nonsense theory: she would suffer equally well whilst in stasis, because Cruciatus would seize her consciousness without regard to the physical effects of the potions. It would only make her more vulnerable because we'd have trapped her in a body she couldn't control to run, jump, flinch, scream, cry. I'd think that prospect might make Voldemort the more viciously pleased to prolong his

torture of her.

It's horrible. Too, too horrible.

I'm still stuck here at the office--I was called in at noon on an emergency basis. You'll have seen the list of names in the *Prophet* today. I suspect they'll have more details tomorrow, but I can fill in some of it.

Raids started Thursday night, beginning with six arrests in a rather seedy but well-secured flat in Northampton. Individuals involved with this cell are specifically accused of targeting the Malfoys. The big fish in this group was a man by the name of John Grant, originally from York, who worked as a regional distributor for a catering firm that supplies camps all over the midlands and east (and therefore he had contacts with cells in these other areas). Two of the others taken into custody, brothers Robert and Thomas Wintour, worked with the same company. Christopher Wright worked at the Daventry camp (his father, John Wright, was also picked up). Everard Digby was the sixth. Besides the regional coordination that John Grant did, this group worked at spreading copies of their Grim Truths into the camps and building a recruitment network.

Interrogation of suspects detained over the past month led to the arrests in Northampton and another cluster in York where they caught Thom Percy and Roberta Keyes, who were operating one of Dogstar's underground presses. The press has been seized, and MLE has confiscated a cache of seditious materials in a warehouse in Ripon. Simultaneously, a man called Eric Wood was detained, along with his muggleborn housekeeper. I don't have any details concerning the charges in that instance.

What got me called in today was the need to process a large group of muggle and muggleborn labourers, because the enclave where they've been working, in the Vale of Glamorgan in Wales, was raided last night. Again, the name 'Wood' has come up. Molly, I'm sorry to say it includes members of Oliver Wood's family (Oliver was a roommate in Gryffindor with our Percy).

Most of the people I interviewed this afternoon were very tight-lipped, obviously not trusting me, but the mothers of young children among them are clearly terrified that their families might now be split up between various camps. Molly, it would have broken your heart--one of them got down on her knees, literally on her knees, to beg me for

mercy. Sickening. I did my best to soothe her and will certainly try to find them temporary assignments where families may remain together, but of course what happens to them in the long run depends upon the course of the investigation. It's curious: there are quite a few very young children in the group, considering it was supposed to be exclusively a labouring community. I have not heard anything concerning any accusations of involvement of this group with Dogstar. It may be that they have run afoul of various regulations concerning their adherence to purity codes (I believe there is evidence of at least one pureblood/muggleborn relationship, with children from the union). I am not sure yet whether that is simply an excuse on the part of authorities for some other, hidden agenda, or simple fact.

I've had word of yet more arrests last night, in Leeds, but don't have details. Bill, can you add any more information?

It's become increasingly clear that the Vale of Glamorgan was a refuge of sorts for both muggles and muggleborns. Sort of a commune, if you will, run by several branches of the Wood and Ackerley families. They weren't involved with Dogstar (although that has been muddled in the *Prophet*). By way of a mix of bribes, sloppy record-keeping, and the occasional use of Imperius and Confundus, the wizarding families of Vale Glamorgan tracked down all their surviving muggle neighbors and arranged to have them consigned to them as 'labourers.' The muggles don't seem to have been under any constraint to stay, so with luck a few may have slipped through the Ministry's cordon, though the raid came at night and they had little warning. Their 'labour' seems to have taken the form of farming, and the produce from the farms appears to have been shared equally among wizard and muggle residents of the Vale. The muggles are all in excellent health, even down to their teeth, and apparently wizarding potions such as Dreamless Sleep were found in some of the muggle homes.

It must have been a lovely arrangement, while it lasted. But naturally, such beautiful cooperation between wizards (including a few muggleborns) and muggles is complete anathema under our present regime and must be soundly punished. And so we spent the morning squabbling over their fates. I don't know what will happen to the adult pureblood or halfblood wizards, as that's not my department, but I am sure it will be quite grim. I do know that their children will all be taken away and fostered with other families.

There were eight muggleborn wizards--well, nine, but one managed to kill himself within twenty-four hours of being placed in custody by the simple expedient of hanging himself with his belt. A check of the records showed that the muggleborns are apparently the newest arrivals. They were only there for a few years, and so I wondered whether the argument could be made that that they should be

retrained for service somewhere they'd be treated 'properly.' There's always demand these days. The opinion was bruited about around the conference table, however, that the muggleborns in question most likely had been entirely 'ruined' by their dangerous exposure to traitorous ideas. A consensus quickly developed that they should be turned over for experimentation, meaning they'll be given to the likes of Rookwood and Carrow.

There are close to two hundred muggles, on the other hand, many of them children obviously too young to work. Deverill and Harkiss cheerfully spent fifteen minutes in a barbaric argument over whether it would be better to kill all the adults, or merely kill the men and then split up the women and children (with no regard to family ties of course). variety in a routine or things you can do while standing in a queue or waiting for the lifts at the Ministry. Of course, I also keep up with what our trainers write in their journals--Professor Myddleton, for instance, is simply fascinating on magical techniques for enhancing memory and mental keenness.

I suppose that's more than you wanted to know! I hope you do enjoy the experiences you'll have in this CCF programme. It sounds absolutely nift.

Greetings, British Journal-Readers.

The recent Vale of Glamorgan arrests have left us all saddened and chastened. What a loss. What a terrible waste. And as the news keeps coming in waves and waves, we wonder, was it worth it? Was it worth risking the lives of so many innocent and blameless children, not to mention their ignorant parents, who were coerced into a dangerous and unsustainable existence by the very people entrusted with caring for them? A black day indeed.

As a people, we have suffered much, and experienced great losses. This is one great blow after an even larger one, the death of a true patriot and leader whose shadow still looms over us in memory. And as we work through our great grief upon the loss of one of our own, and sort out the best way to honour him, we must ask ourselves, what would Sirius Black say? What would he do? It is our honest belief that he, too, would hang his head in sorrow with the news of the arrests and harsh punishment of so many of Britain's Wizarding finest, and the unfortunate deaths of so many other innocent lives. He would ask, "What was it all for?" And, dear friends, we cannot answer him. Because, indeed, what was it all for?

No matter how soft your hearts may be to the plight of the Muggle and Mudblood workers, you must always remember that the danger is not just on your shoulders. Witches and Wizards of Britain, this is clearly not an effective way to create change. A system must be challenged from within for true growth to occur, and much as though it can feel as though you're sitting on a tin can, watching the world pass away before you, patience is key. Our day will come, and not through radical acts of terror like Dogstar, or through isolation and subversion like the Vale of Glamorgan.

We will not win with poisons and bombs, just as we cannot succeed by blatantly breaking the law in a way that can only ever meet with punishment rather than sparking discourse and actual change. Reasonable, measured action consists of challenging these laws through the Wizengamot and through the Ministry, rather than by taking the law into our own hands. 
