When it comes to Harry specifically, well, each boy is different, isn't he? Harry's grown up around people trying to tell him what to do or how to think or what other people think of him. I'd imagine he'd find it difficult to openly express himself, but at the same time, he'd appreciate the opportunity if given it. He's also probably used to people going out of their way to curry favour. Of course, food is always a concern. With the latest smuggling round, though, we have enough staples to last us before the next growing season with room for two more fullgrown adults at the table. We'll put in a bit of an extra effort to add to our supplies with regular fishing, and next growing season, we'll plow another field and continue to aggressively breed our goats and chickens to cover everything.

So yes.

I think if Davidson knows two people who are patient and good with children, lots and lots of them, we'd be grateful.
